What a glorious four days! The elements were on our side as Alice Springs/Mparntwe played host to some of the most talented, generous and inspiring writers in the country. Highlights? There were so many ... The 1001 Nights Afghan Feast was a spicy sensation, with Arnold Zable reading a poignant piece about a drowning and Najaf Mazari sharing his journey from war-torn Iraq to Villawood Detention Centre to freedom in Melbourne. The perennially entertaining Linda Jaivin also enticed the crowds with excerpts from A Most Immoral Woman while Jo Dutton provided political bite and Kenny Laughton, unquestionably, put the cream on the evening.

More wallet-friendly were the events staged at the Todd Tavern and the Town Council Lawns. The Todd was the venue for the Desert Poetry Slam where Wire MC and Choo Choo hosted an eclectic evening of all-in entertainment, while the Lawns saw the best in NT Indigenous music and performance with featured artists Shellie Morris, Steve Gumerungi Hodder, Ali Cobby-Eckermann, South East and Tjupi Band keeping the crowds jumping. The book launches were also free and gave us a chance to show off our fabulous NT talent. Ali Cobby-Eckermann and Jennifer Mills launched their debut books and the NT Indigenous Anthology was given a sneak preview.

Closing Night Crime featuring Shane Maloney and Jennifer Byrne had us all rolling in the aisles, the breakfasts and literary lunch were sumptuous, and the screening of Samson and Delilah had double the impact, given its Alice Springs setting. However, anyone who attended the Words in the Dust event at Simpsons Gap will testify that, indeed, this was the gem in the festival crown. To quote ASA's Jeremy Fisher: 'I doubt anyone who was there will forget the Sunday evening reading by Arnold Zable at Simpsons Gap. We sat or lay on the sand of the dry river, listening to Arnold's words. Roos came up behind us in the dusk to listen, too. Overhead, the stars sparked in a clear sky. The NT Writers' Centre is making a donation in acknowledgement of all he has done over the years.

I'd like to let members know that the Literature Board of the Australia Council has revised its Key Organisations category. They are looking to support organisations that can demonstrate that they are national centres for excellence. Whilst the NT Writers' Centre can demonstrate it achieves outcomes on a national level, we will need to review and revise our focus and funding objectives. The Committee and staff are currently working on this, and will be making an Expression of Interest to the Australia Council in October. Regardless of which direction we move towards and how this will be funded, we will retain our commitment to the development and promotion of Northern Territory writers and literature. In this regard, our programs, festivals and initiatives will remain largely unchanged. Coming up over the next few months we have: the Rhonda Whitton workshop series in Darwin (27-29 June); the Jan Cornall masterclass in Alice Springs (5 July) which will be invaluable to those working on major projects; the Harry Laing workshops in Darwin (11 July); Darwin Festival events in August; theatre productions/readings in August; and the popular *Meet the Publisher* in Alice and Darwin (4-7) September. April 2008 marked the beginning of my time as a project officer for the Barkly region for NTWC, and the following month we had a workshop held for all writers of the Tennant Creek and surrounding regions with Amber Hammill from IAD press, Ali Cobby Eckermann and Terry Whitebeach. This workshopped the works all writers were submitting to the upcoming IAD and NT Writers' joint publication of "This Country, Anytime, Anywhere"- the anthology of new Indigenous writing from the Northern Territory. It was a thoughtful and very personal time for all involved in that workshop.

We also had Sandra Thibodeaux come up in October last year for a writers' performance night which was well attended at the Nyinkka Nyunyu Aboriginal Art and Culture Centre in Tennant Creek. We had a mixture of Indigenous and non-Indigenous people read their work, including Maureen O'Keefe and Valerie Nelson from Ali Curung. Zaddock Johnson from the local Winanjjikari Music Centre and myself

played a few tunes to keep the writers entertained. After that, we had Sophie Cunningham of Meanjin come to Tennant to speak with all the writers about their work and all aspects involved. I personally found Sophie to be very engaging and helpful when it came to talking about writing as an artform and profession. She was lively and totally with us the whole time and when I looked around the room at the people that turned up, I gathered I was not the only one who got a lot out of her workshop.

We had our "Eye Of The Storm" Writers' festival in Alice this year, and I thought it to be a successful activity-filled few days. The Anthology people read their work at the Olive Pink Botanic Gardens to an appreciative audience. There was the Poetry Slam at the Todd Tavern and the concert night, just to name a few of the things we got up to. Overall, the festival was booked out most of the time and everyone who attended workshops and events got their money's worth.

The Barkly writers that I know of and have worked with, such as Rosemary Plummer, Maureen O'Keefe, Valerie nelson, David Curtis and myself haven't had so much activity in the writing sense as we have had the past year, and the proof of that is in the upcoming anthology. There is a chunk of Barkly talent featured in it, and I think it will be well worth the read. We always had a strong voice ... we just haven't had the opportunity for it to be heard as it has been this past year. So, thank you, Writers' Centre NT, and keep it coming.

Rhonda Whitton is a qualified journalist and experienced teacher. She is the author of *A Decent Proposal: how to sell your work to an Australian Publisher*. Rhonda conducts workshops at Australian Writers Centres, teaches specialist writing short courses and corporate training in various aspects of business writing. She teaches professional writing at the Gordon Institute of TAFE in Geelong. She also teaches as part of the short course program at various writers' centres, universities, TAFEs and the CAE. Rhonda is also well known to writers as the editor of the invaluable, *The Writer's Marketplace*.

In addition to A Decent Proposal, she will also be offering a workshop on freelance journalism. Don't miss this chance to get tips from an expert about the world of journalism, writing and publishing.

An intense experience of poetry often acts as a springboard for participants' own creativity which can be expressed in writing poetry or writing in other forms such as story, journal, monologue.

Because poetry often taps a deeper vein – of experience, feelings, a wondering about the universe – it can be a catalyst for creative expression, stimulating an inventive use of words as well as encouraging experimentation with different shapes and styles of writing.


